## Economic Development Corridor Program Is A Must For Arkansas

Response to the Economic Development Corridor Program throughout the State has been tremendous. In August and September, the members of the Highway Commission attended nine regional meetings to explain the program and listen to the public's comments regarding the long-term effects such a program would have on Arkansas. An article on these meetings begins on page 2 of this issue of Arkansas Highways.

I would like to thank the Arkansas Good Roads/Transportation Council and the eight regional Planning and Development Districts for hosting the meetings which were attended by more than 2,000 people from all sections of the state, as well as many of our State Legislators.

The meetings were part of the overall process of developing a program which will be presented to the State Legislature in January.

The comments received at each meeting, as well as the results of hundreds of questionnaires that were returned following each meeting, will be reviewed by the Commission and the Department staff.

There is no doubt that a program to provide four-lane highways throughout Arkansas is needed. The

There is no doubt that a program to provide four-lane highways throughout Arkansas is needed. The people have indicated, through their comments, that they support such a proposal. Many said we shoul have started years ago. Our neighboring states are well on their way to getting similar programs started, and we are playing catch-up.

The big question to answer is; how are we going to pay for this program? The Commissioners will be addressing this question between now and January. There are many areas to look into. The obvious sources of additional funding are the current highway user fees, such as motor fuel taxes and vehicle registration fees. This year alone, 15 states increased their motor fuel taxes to fund highway improvements. With the continued decline in the availability of federal funds, the states must rely more and more on their own sources of revenues to get the job done.

The federal role in future highway programs is unclear. The present federal aid program expires in 1991. The funding for the Interstate Highway program is slated to end in fiscal year 1993. There is a general feeling that the federal aid highway program will change dramatically once the focus shifts from the Interstates. Arkansas, like many other states, cannot afford to set back and wait for the federal government to decide what role it will play in the future. Our needs are now. We must have the resources available at the state level to meet these needs.

An independent study shows that the 1985 Rural Road Program adds \$150 million annually to the gross income of this state. Just think what this Economic Development Corridor Program might do! The income it would add and the highway system it could develop in Arkansas would be the envy of the nation.

# Public Forums Conducted On Four-Lane Highway Program

With the help of the Highway and Transportation Department, the Arkansas Good Roads/Transportation Council and eight regional Planning and Development Districts embarked on an ambitious schedule of public meetings around the state in August and September.

The purpose of the meetings was to gain input from the citizens of Arkansas regarding the four-lane highway program that the Highway Commission plans to propose in the next legislative session. Nine meetings were scheduled beginning August 9 in Monticello and concluding September 27 in North Little Rock.

Dr. Silas D. Snow, President of the AGR/TC, said the meetings were needed for the Commission to get some idea of public sentiment toward the program. "It is vitally important that our state and local officials be made aware of the public's feelings concerning this program in order that the best decisions be made relative to transportation issues and our state's future economic development," Snow said.

About 325 people filled the Fine Arts Center Auditorium on the campus of the University of Arkansas at Monticello for the first meeting. Following presentations from AHTD Chief Engineer Charles Venable and Glen Bell of the Southeast Arkansas Economic Development District, Highway Commissioner Bill Clark, of Hot Springs, presented the Commission's viewpoint. "This is being called a highway program," Clark said. "In reality, it is an economic development program. Highways are just one ingredient in the overall economic development of our state."

Fourteen persons spoke at the meeting regarding the corridor program. Betty Flynn, a Crossett resident who formerly lived in Mississippi and is familiar with their four-lane highway program, seemed to sum up the crowd's feelings best when she received the loudest ovation from the audience. She said she wanted to send a message to the Legislature and the Governor that the people of southeast Arkansas are behind the program 100% and that they will support a tax increase to do it. "If

Mississippi can do it," she exclaimed, we can do it better!"

Forrest City, on August 16 and 23 respectively, drew smaller, but equally supportive crowds. In Jonesboro, Dr. Dan Hoyt of Arkansas State University, presented a slide presentation emphasizing the "JIT" (just in time) philosophy and its potential for northeast Arkansas. He specifically mentioned the importance of Highways 63, 67, 1, 18, and 412.

And in Forrest City, Sharon Mars, Executive Vice President of the Forrest City Chamber of Commerce, explained that good roads would enhance the "quality of life" in the Forrest City area and could be used to attract residential development from Memphis. "Forrest City is as close [to downtown Memphis] as Germantown," she stated.

The highway program as it was presented at the public meetings was developed last year by the Highway Commission at the request of Arkansas business and industrial leaders. The program identifies the major highway corridors in the state and proposes to widen those routes to four-lanes.



Specifically, every city of 10,000 population or more would be connected with a four-lane highway, and all cities of 5,000 or more population not on a four-lane road would be connected to the system by improved two- and three-lane highways. It is felt that these improvements would allow all areas of the state to compete effectively for new industry without transportation being an impediment. Also, commerce, tourism, and recreational travel would be enhanced by the safer, more efficient highways.

Each meeting produced much food for thought for the Highway Commissioners. In addition to oral and written statements taken at each meeting, questionnaires were also passed out to all those in attendance. The survey asked the citizens if they felt Arkansas' highways were adequate to attract new business, if they would support a new highway program and, if so, how would they be willing to pay for it. Additionally, several banks and savings and loans around the state have agreed to mail the questionnaires into the hands of Arkansans.

The Commission plans to use the results of the surveys in their formulation of a specific legislative package.

The meetings have shown that there is a great deal of support for a highway program, but the big question is how to fund it. State Senator Morrill Harriman, of Alma, stressed in his remarks to the more than 350 people in attendance at the Harrison meeting August 30. "Meetings such as this are extremely important. We [the Legisla-

ture] are supportive of the roads - you don't need to make believers out of us. We know that they will bring about economic development, they will create jobs, they will create money for the people of this state. But we still have to find the sources of funding, and that's what you [the public] have to tell us about," he stated.

## Second Phase of Pine Bluff Project Completed

The opening of the Plum Street Railroad Overpass in Pine Bluff on September 15 marked the completion of the second phase of work on the city's railroad relocation project.

The Plum Street crossing is the first of five railroad overpasses to be built in Pine Bluff as part of the Railroad Relocation Demonstration Project approved by Congress in 1976. Pine Bluff and eleven other cities nationwide were selected to receive federal funds to eliminate railroad/highway conflict points.

Mayor Carolyn Robinson noted at the dedication ceremony held on top of the overpass that "these overpasses are vital for uninterrupted traffic north and south of Pine Bluff." She also stressed the importance of the overpasses for emergency vehicles.

The first phase of work included the consolidation of the Union Pacific and St. Louis Southwestern lines along one corridor through the city. That work was completed in June 1987 at a cost of \$1.2 million. The Plum Street Overpass was built for \$1.7 million.

The next phase of work will be the construction of an overpass at Sixth Street at an estimated cost of \$3 million. Work is currently underway on reconstructing Third Street along the removed Cotton Belt track to provide another east-west arterial in the downtown business district.

Former Mayor Dave Wallace noted that the completion of the overpass comes after 15 years of hard work by many people in Pine Bluff and the State's congressional delegation. He joined Mayor Robinson in thanking Senator Dale Bumpers and the late Senator John McClellan for their efforts in securing funding for the project over the years.

## **BRIDGE INSPECTION PROGRAM**

### "Is this bridge safe to cross?" "Will it safely support my vehicle?"

These are questions we rarely consider as we travel the states' highways. Only when we hear or read of a bridge collapse do we realize that bridge safety is a critical concern. Bridges are a vital and integral link in our highway networks. Keeping these bridges open and safe for public use is the focus of Arkansas" Bridge Inspection Program.

Following the 1967 collapse of the Silver Creek Bridge over the Ohio River resulting in 46 deaths, Congress established Federal law requiring all states to develop and implement an on-going bridge inspection program. This Federal Aid Highway Act of 1968 required the Secretary of Transportation, with the state highway agencies, to develop the National Bridge Inspection Standards (NBIS). The Act also required each state to establish and maintain a current inventory of all bridges on the Federal Aid Highway System. The Surface Transportation Assistance Act of 1978 greatly expanded the program to require that all bridge length structures on the public highway system (state, county, city) be inspected. Currently there are

approximately 13,000 structures in Arkansas' inventory and the NBIS requires inspection of the bridges be made at least once every two years.

With this in mind and to ensure appropriate inspector training, a comprehensive bridge inspection training course was held in North Little Rock July 18-29. Forty-five AHTD District and Central Office personnel participated in the two-week course conducted by the engineering firm of Michael Baker, Jr., Inc. of Beaver, Pennsylvania.

The overall goal was to increase the uniformity and objectivity of Arkansas' Bridge Inspections in order to accurately assess bridge conditions and to place the Highway and Transportation Department in full compliance with National Bridge Inspection Standards. The course provided in-depth technical and practical training regarding bridge inspection, including the field inspection of three bridges.

## DeVall's Bluff Bridge Reopens

Travel between DeVall's Bluff and Biscoe is back to normal thanks to the reopening August 22 of the Highway 70 bridge crossing the White River. The usual four-mile trip was extended to six times that distance when the bridge was closed in January after a barge on the river struck one of the bridges' concrete piers.

The impact caused the center lift span of the bridge to jamb in the raised position, forcing the closure of the structure. Highway and Transportation Department officials first feared that the concrete pier was severely damaged in the accident, but a thorough inspection later found the pier to be sound. The force of the impact caused the bridges' two 20,000-pound counterweights to slam into the bridge frame damaging the overhead trusses on the lift span.

During the time the bridge was closed, motorists had to use the Interstate 40 bridge north of Highway 70 to cross the White River. This required a detour of several miles in either direction. In February, the AHTD spent approximately \$10,000 improving Webb Lake Road for use as an Iternate detour. Webb Lake Road was previously a closed gravel road running between DeVall's Bluff and the rest area on I-40. This action by the Department helped to cut the detour length in half for local travelers.

Jensen Construction Company of Des Moines, Iowa, began repair work on the bridge in April. One approach span, the lift towers, and the lift span were repaired at a cost of \$930,484. For the residents of DeVall's Bluff and Biscoe, this was money well spent.



## Public Hearing Held on Widening of Fort Smith Thoroughfare

Approximtely 100 interested citizens gathered August 18 to see and hear about plans for the widening of portions of Waldron Road and Grand Avenue in Fort Smith.

The public hearing, which was held in the Gardner Lecture Hall on the Westark Community College campus, primarily attracted homeowners from the area whose property will be directly affected by the project.

The project calls for the widening of Waldron Road from two to five lanes between Euper Lane and the Grand Avenue intersection. Grand will be widened from two to five lanes from Waldron Road to Interstate 540. Improvements will also be made to the Waldron Road/Grand Avenue intersection. Total project length is approximately two miles.

Strib Boynton, Fort Smith City Administrator, outlined the background of the project for those in attendance. He explained how U.S. Representative John Paul Hammer-schmidt of Harrison sponsored legislation naming the project as a demonstration project. By doing this, he said, 80% of the funds for the widening will come from the Federal government and be administered by the AHTD. The remaining 20% will come from Fort Smith's one-cent sales tax for street and drainage improvements.

Detailed design plans for the project were presented by Roy Grimes, of Grimes Consulting Engineers, Inc. The route selected, he stated, was the least damaging for the homes and businesses along the route. Only six homes and two businesses will have to be relocated under the plan, Grimes said.

Jim Fooks and Danny Arendt, of the AHTD's Acquisition and Relocation Sections respectively, explained how their personnel would be handling the project. Appraisals should begin in October, Fooks said, and Arendt briefly explained the various types of relocation assistance available to those who qualify.

## **Bridges Dedicated North of Hector**

Monday, June 6, was a happy day for residents of Hector and Tilly in Pope County. Dedication ceremonies were held that day for two new bridges crossing the Illinois Bayou on Highway 27. Several lifelong residents of the area attended the ceremony and called the project "a blessing" for the people who regularly travel that stretch of highway.

Arkansas Highway Commision Vice Chairman Raymond Pritchett presented the keynote address at the informal gathering on one of the bridges. The project was necessary, he said, because the two old bridges were no longer considered adequate. One bridge, a narrow metal truss bridge, was replaced by a 502-foot composite W-beam span bridge. The second bridge, approximately 300 feet in length, was constructed three and one-half miles north of the first one. It replaced a "low-water bridge" which often had to be closed during heavy rains, occasionally stranding residents and schoolchildren for hours at a time Both bridges were constructed by Mobley Contractors of Morrilton. Total cost of the project was approximately \$1.32 million.


## Burmese Engineers Training at AHTD

Five engineers from the Asian country of Burma are spending time at the Arkansas State Highway and Transportation Department. The five are here as part of a United Nations program which enables professionals from a developing nation to spend an extended period of time learning first-hand how their jobs are performed in a more advanced country. The trip was coordinated by the Arkansas Council for International Visitors. The five Burmese engineers are Kyi Wa, Soe Thein, Lin Kyi, HIa Soe and Maung Maung Lwin. All but Maung Maung Lwin arrived in late June. He arrived in mid-September.

During their visit, the engineers will learn about highway planning, construction, and maintenance. "They are highway engineers who want to learn more about our transportation system so they can improve theirs," said Catherine Cockrill, co-chairman of the ACIV. She commented that the engineers would train at the Department until mid-December.

In addition to their professional training, the Burmese will spend time with host families. According to Cockrill, part of the program involves a cultural exchange between the Burmese and the people of Arkansas.

The Socialist Republic of the Union of Burma is bordered by China, India, and Thailand. It covers approximately 262,000 square miles, which is slightly smaller than the state of Texas. The climate there is tropical, which made the hot Arkansas summer feel almost normal to our five visitors. They hope to return to Burma in December with many helpful ideas.

# Highway Police Holds Drug Identification Seminar

Would you or your supervisor be able to recognize the symptoms of a fellow worker if he or she came to work impaired by drugs? This question and others were addressed June 22 and 23 at the North Little Rock Ramada Inn as the Arkansas Highway Police sponsored a Drug Identification and Enforcement Seminar for Supervisors.

The course, attended by 48 supervisors, included all AHP District Commanders, Assistant District Commanders, Station Supervisors, and many District Engineers and Division Heads.

According to AHP Lt. James Brown, this was a basic drug identification course designed to give persons in a supervisory capacity some knowledge of the types and effects of drugs they may encounter in the workplace. This included profiles of typical drug users found in the workforce and how to handle them if they are detected.

## HISTORIC BRIDGE INVENTORY COMPLETED BY AHTD

The Highway and Transportation Department has completed its historic bridge inventory and, as a result, forty bridges will be saved from destruction and placed on the National Register of Historic Places. According to Chief Bridge Engineer Veral Pinkerton, that should translate into about \$50 million worth of new bridge construction to replace these structures over the next few years. This

The historic bridge inventory was completed in response to Executive Order 11953 issued in 1971 by President Richard Nixon. It directed all Federal agencies to inventory all historic or archeological properties for which they may be responsible.

The newly completed bridge inventory shows about 2,600 bridges which meet the minimum age requirement of 50 years. These bridges were further evaluated by AHTD Archeologist/Historian Burney McClurkan and the AHTD Historic Bridge Review Committee. This evaluation took into consideration the bridges' type, builder, uniqueness or

rarity, and condition, as well as age. Their conclusions led to the 40 bridges being named to the Historic Register.

According to Pinkerton, "Very few of the old bridges can be renovated. The structural alterations involved in renovating could compromise the bridges' historical character."

"We'll try to replace the old bridges with new bridges close to the original crossing," says McClurkan. But he adds that this is "impossible to do in some areas where we're locked in on bridge approaches."

Many of the historic bridges selected have colorful pasts. One of these is the Highway 62 bridge crossing the White River in Cotter. Had it not been for some quick thinking by former Baxter County Judge R.M. Ruthven, the bridge may not have been built.

It seems that the Highway Commission in the mid-1920's authorized feasibility studies for nine proposed new bridges, one of which was the bridge at Cotter. All of the studies were favorable except for the one for the Cotter bridge. Judge Ruthven noticed this before the Highway




Highay 62 bridge crossing the White River in Cotter.

Commission had a chance to look over the report. When the Commission met to consider the studies, the report for he proposed Cotter bridge was missing. Thinking this was just an oversight, the Commission approved the bridge for Cotter along with the others. Construction was authorized and the bridge was completed in 1930.

Twenty years later, Judge Ruthven mailed the negative feasibility study to the Highway Commission and admitted that he had taken the report home with him so they would not see it.

Since its completion, not only has the bridge been added to the National Register of Historic Places, but in 1986 it was designated as a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark by the American Society of Civil Engineers. Most importantly, the old bridge has served the needs of the region effectively for 58 years.



The Springfield Bridge crossing Cadron Creek between Faulkner and Conway Countles is the oldest steel bridge still in use in the state. It is located on Faulkner County Road 222 and, according to data on file at the Faulkner County Courthouse, was constructed in 1871.

## 1.2-Mile Section of Interstate 40 Widened in North Little Rock

Construction has been completed on a 1.2-mile stretch of Interstate 40 in North Little Rock between Interstate 30 and the Highway 67/167 interchange.

A fourth travel lane was added in each direction to help accommodate the large volume of traffic using that portion of highway.

During construction, the work zone was the site of numerous traffic accidents which prompted the Arkansas Highway Police Division to begin around-the-clock surveillance through the construction zone.

Total cost for the construction, which included the remodeling of three bridges, was approximately \$8.5 million.

## Highway Police Lieutenant Proves She's Worthy of the Challenge

From the time she was 13 years old, Sue Sehon knew she wanted to be a law enforcement officer. Now, at age 31, not only is she a law enforcement officer, but she is the first female to reach the rank of Lieutenant within the Arkansas Highway Police Division of the State Highway and Transportation Department.

Apparently, police work got into her blood when she became a Cadet with the Ashdown Police Department as a teenager. "As a Cadet, we didn't have any authority. We just rode around with a Police Officer, and I got real interested in it," Sehon said. "I spent most of my time at the police station. My mom usually had to call me there to tell me to come home."

She continued to work as a radio dispatcher for the police department through high school. Following graduation she worked as a dispatcher for the Little River County Sheriff's Office while attending Texarkana College. Sehon joined the Highway Police as a Patrolman in September 1978 and graduated from the Arkansas Law Enforcement Training Academy in November of that year. She was promoted to Corporal in December 1983 and attained the rank of Sergeant in February 1987. She became the Department's first female Lieutenant in May of this year and is currently in charge of the weigh station on Highway 71 south of Ashdown.

Sehon admits that she briefly considered pursuing a

medical career rather than law enforcement. "I thought about going into medicine, but I didn't take chemistry in high school. When I took college chemistry, it changed my mind real quick," she said. She was working for the Sheriff's Department at the time, and decided that her skills were best suited for police work. She began assisting deputies with their work and investigations, and would ride with one of them anytime they would let her. "It was great practical experience," Sehon recalls.


When her career began with the AHP, she was only the third female law enforcement officer ever to be hired by the Division. She began working at the old Ashdown Weigh Station and was there until it closed. She then began commuting to the Hope Weigh Station. Soon thereafter, she expressed an interest in being assigned to a patrol unit and manning a set of portable scales, which weigh about 50 pounds. Roy Johnson, who was AHP Chief at that time, was hesitant at first. Sehon recalls, "Chief Johnson told me I couldn't handle it and I said, 'Chief, I've been hauling hay singe I was 8 years old - I believe I can pick up a scale.' I said, 'Just give me a chance,' and he did."

One of Sehon's first partners in a patrol unit was AHP Cpl. Doyle Crouch. Ironically, it was Crouch who was the Ashdown police officer in charge of the Cadet Program when Sehon began as a police cadet. She credits Crouch and former AHP Lt. Bob McKellar with teaching her much

about law enforcement. Sehon has been at the new Ashdown Weigh Station since it opened in July 1987. She says that she misses her friends on patrol, but not the situations. "The action at this station is enough for me," she commented.

In her present capacity, Sehon supervises a staff of 8 to 10. "I want to make this a really good station," she says of her position. She compliments her staff, saying all the officers are good and want to help her in making the Ashdown station one of the best. She says that the station currently weighs in excess of 2,000 trucks per week.

As for the future, Lt. Sehon doesn't rule out pursuing other advancement opportunities, but she admits that she is very happy with her current situation. "I don't really want to move away from here," she stated. "I've got a home and my family is here." Judging from her past, Lt. Sue Sehon will stick with and make the most of, any decision she makes regarding her future. No doubt, she will be worthy of the challenge.

## Department Has First Female Construction Party Chief

Teresa Maze, a ten-year AHTD employee, has become the first female Construction Party Chief in the Highway Department. Maze, 31, was promoted to that position in April of this year.

Maze began her career with the Department as a summer employee while she was a civil engineering student at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville. After completing two years of study, she quit school and became a full-time AHTD employee in 1979. She has served as a Construction Aide, Engineering Aide, Senior Construction Aide, and Inspector during her career with the Department.

Maze is married to Ralph Maze, who is a Finish Motor Patrol Operator on the Washington II Maintenance Crew. They met while she worked as a flagger during her first summer of employment when she was in school. She said that the fact that they now work out of the same area leadquarters is "very convenient and economical."

As a Construction Party Chief, Maze puts her two years of studying civil engineering to good use. She and her crew mostly do survey work - checking curve data, establishing

centerlines, and determining cut or fill quantities - before and during the construction process. The crew she supervises fluctuates between 3 and 6 people, depending on the type of work they are performing.

"I like the surveying better than the inspecting," Maze said, referring to her former position. "I don"t have to argue with the contractors near as much now."

Apparently Maze has become a pretty good teacher since she stopped being a student. George Jones, a civil engineering student at Fayetteville, has spent two summers working with Maze as a seasonal employee. "She helps me apply what I learn in class," Jones said. "She's good to explain things to me that I might not learn in class."

Maze says that she doesn't have any plans to go back to school and complete her degree in the near future. She and her husband have two children, Jeffery, age 7, and Daniel, age 3. "Maybe I'll go back when the children get older, Maze said. But she admits that she is happy with the way her career is going now, and that the degree doesn't seem as important now as it once did.

Dear Mr. Tyler:

First I will send you the much delayed letter which I promised a month or so back complimenting your work on the highways in the area following the two heavy snows of this past winter. When James Patterson of A&P Truck Lines and myself were discussing the work you did immediately following the first snow, we agreed that you did a much better job than the State of Texas Highway Department. I had promised James that I was going to write you on your snow removal and that I would send him a copy of the letter.

What really inspired me this week was the work you're doing on the Highway 355 shoulders between Yellow Creek bridge and McNab. 




