

Mapping Arkansas for 36 Years

Larry Newman, Cartographer Supervisor, has been working in the Mapping Section of the AHTD for 36 years. Between the time he came to work at the Department, in 1973, and the time he retired, earlier this month, he has seen many changes in the way maps are drawn and produced.

“Digital technology has definitely changed the map making process,” says Newman. “The introduction of things such as the computer, mapping software, Global Positioning Systems (GPS) and

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Geographic Information Systems (GIS) has enhanced the Mapping and Graphics Section's ability to fulfill our responsibilities and expand our contribution to the Department. Replacing the drafting table with the computer work station is one of the biggest changes I've seen."

And the new technology has made mapping easier.

"When I started at AHTD, mapping was a manual process," Newman recalls. "The process consisted of compilation of information such as roads and culture of the county being updated, a scribing process using the compiled information to create the county map and shooting negatives of the completed county scribe to make a mylar print that was used to make copies for distribution. The technology we use today allows the cartographer to accomplish most of the mapping process from a work station. The main thing technology afforded the cartographer is a better tool to accomplish the end result. In this sense, it has made it easier."

The Mapping Section's contributions to the Department are numerous. The Section produces general county maps, local road number maps, city maps, State General Highway Maps, Arkansas State Highway Maps, County Route and Section maps, Special Project maps and many others too numerous to mention in this article.

Even with the new technology today, it can take a long time to produce a particular map.


"As an example, it takes approximately one to two months depending on the number of changes that occur from year to year to produce the State Highway Map," Newman explains. "We also map all 75 counties as well as all of the incorporated areas within those counties. Those can take up to six months to update but we don't update every one every year."

The Mapping and Graphics Section is well prepared for the challenge.

"We have ten employees in our section. All of the cartographers in the Section work on maps," Newman explains. "Since GIS has become an important part of the Section, some employees do spend part of their work day on those kinds of projects."

Newman's own contributions to the Department span 36 years.

"Growing up I always enjoyed drawing and things that had to do with art," Newman recalls. "When I went to college, I majored in art, graduating from Henderson State University with a BSE in Art Education. I was fortunate to go to work for AHTD in a Commercial Art position located in the Mapping and Graphics Section. After several years, I had the opportunity to move to a cartographer position

where I was in the special mapping area. I then was promoted to my position as Cartographic Supervisor of the Section."

Hired as a commercial artist when he began at AHTD, Newman's interest in his own art continues today.

"My main interest has always been pen and ink. In fact, I have been asked to do some pen and ink drawings for special projects here at the Department. I don't do as much art work as I used to because of the demands of my job. Hopefully, now that I am retiring, I will be able to do more of that."

Newman had some thoughts on how the new technology affects what commercial artists do.

"It hasn't changed what they do, but it has changed how they do it. If you look at a magazine that has been around for 50 years, you can see the difference technology has made by placing it next to one produced today. A commercial artist still has to come up with the ideas, but carrying out those ideas to the printed page is a much easier process."

For those interested in a career as a cartographer, Newman was asked what schooling is required.

"To start as a Cartographer I in the Mapping and Graphics Section, the minimum requirements include the

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educational equivalent of a bachelor's degree in geography or a related field, some experience with Computer Aided Design and Drafting (CADD) and GIS, the ability to interpret and utilize aerial photography and the ability to read and plot legal descriptions.”

As he closes his career with the AHTD, Newman had some advice for young people getting into cartography or commercial artwork.


“Acquire the education and training necessary to fulfill the qualifications required by a future employer. There is a lot of competition in the job market today so the more you have to offer the better your odds of getting a job in either of these fields.

And what does Newman plan to do now that he is retired?

“I am going on my first cruise and after that I am just going to enjoy being retired and not being on a work schedule.”

Deariens Named Stone County Farm Family of the Year

Phil Dearien is a Distributor Roller Operator in District Five. He and his family are also the 2010 Stone County Farm Family of the Year.

Phil and his wife, Viola, with their two sons Johnnie and Shane, have a farm between Fox and Rushing. It is there that they produce cattle and broilers.

The Dearien farm includes about 60 acres. Almost half of those acres feature hay fields and are occupied by broiler houses. They have four broiler houses that can produce more than 700,000 broilers each year.

“Farming has given us a good life,” the Deariens say. “We work hard, but the benefits are our land, fishing pond, deer hunting, vegetable garden, flower garden, even a good place to play in the snow. We have been blessed.”

The Farm Family competition is judged on production, efficiency and management of farm operations, along with family life, rural/community leadership and values.

The Farm Family of the Year program, now in its 64th year, begins with selection of the top farm family in each county in the state. Then, eight district Farm Families of the Year are selected. The process concludes with a banquet, in December, honoring each county winner, and naming the selection of the state Farm Family of the Year.

In addition to the state banquet, the Deariens will be recognized and presented with a plaque at the Stone County Farm Bureau’s annual meeting in October.

Primary sponsors of the annual recognition program include the Arkansas Farm Bureau, the Arkansas Press Association, AgHeritage FCS, Farm Credit of Western Arkansas, Farm Credit MidSouth and Electric Cooperatives of Arkansas.
